

Directions

For Flowers or plants in pots, sprinkle POO directly around the base of the plant.

For new plants: add a cupful of POO into the hole before planting.

For regular feeding try

Paca Poo Tea

Place the entire bag in a 3 gallon container. Let sit for 24-48 hours. Use the "tea" to feed once a week.

Alpaca Poo Soil Conditioner

NUTRIENTS

Commercial fertilizers are labeled for their N-P-K content. These letters stand for: Nitrogen, Phosphorus and Potassium. Alpaca Poo naturally has all three of these primary nutrients, (1.5, 0.2, 1.1) but in smaller percentages than commercial fertilizers. Therefore, you can safely apply Alpaca Poo to your plants without damaging your plants. Alpaca Poo also contains secondary nutrients such as calcium, magnesium and sulfur that supplement a plant's feeding needs.

SOIL CONDITIONER

Mixing Alpaca Poo with clay soil will loosen the ground and make it more porous. If your soil is too sandy, Alpaca Poo will help the ground bind together and retain moisture.

Germs

To reduce the risk of germs, always wash your hands immediately after handling poo and working in the garden. Wash the food thoroughly or peel a layer away to remove any harmful germs.

Store Alpaca Poo in a cool dry place.

- * Alpacas were once reserved for the Incan royalty and played a central role in the Incan culture, located on the high Andean Plateau and mountains of South America.
- * Alpacas are members of the "Camelid" family, which also includes camels, llamas, vicuna, and guanaco.
- * Alpacas do not have upper teeth, horns, hoofs or claws.
- * Alpacas are, much smaller than Llamas and average 36" tall and 150 pounds.
- * Their fleece is used to make clothing that is hypoallergenic and warmer than wool.

*ALPACA POO is often referred to as "magic beans" because it is such a fantastic plant food and soil conditioner. Alpaca Poo also appears to be a natural deer repellent.
